A Helping Hand: As a club we like to make a point of talking about our support of Sarah's House, a support facility for persons undergoing cancer treatment in our part of Maine. But as individuals, club members also support our community on their own, mostly in silence away from the public spotlight. One of our members, Kit Lane (Dodge) is one of these generous people. Kit volunteers for WindowDressers, a Maine nonprofit that makes lightweight, clear custom-measured window inserts in local workshops throughout the state. The objective is to help Mainers curb heating costs. Kit and other volunteers go to people's homes at no charge to measure windows and provide cost estimates for the materials. Homeowners provide the materials, then WindowDressers holds workshops at which homeowners and WindowDresser volunteers assemble the inserts for the homeowner to install. This is a low-cost solution to reducing heating costs for people who need a little extra help staying warm on cold winter days. While this story is summarized from an article in the *Ellsworth American*, it just seems appropriate to give Kit and the other volunteers some additional recognition.
