We also received a nice note from Heather Massey, the Executive Director of Sarah's House, thanking us for our donation of \$1500. That letter is at the end of this President's letter.


Interesting or Offbeat Corvette News

This month, once again, I have two Corvette-related stories. One tells the story of the last remaining 1983 C4 Corvette “validation” car, one of 44 that most everyone believes were all destroyed in 1982. As development progressed, GM executives realized that key elements of the car were either unavailable or insufficiently developed for the car to be released to the market for the 1983 model year. So, the command went out, “Crush them all.” But one survived and now lives at the National Corvette Museum. (The reason one survived is somewhat amusing. But you have to read nearly to the end of the story to find out why.)

The other article comes from *HotCars.com* and is about another catastrophe at a General Motors facility. On October 22nd, a fire broke out at the \$71M General Motors' Advanced Design Center in Pasadena, CA. In addition to prototypes and an advanced concept car, "the building contained lithium-ion batteries and concept vehicles, a volatile combination that makes firefighting far trickier than a typical structure fire. Lithium-ion cells can ignite without warning, burn at extremely high temperatures, and reignite hours after being doused." The bad news was that "both electric and gasoline-powered prototypes were damaged in the fire." The good news was that "the [California Corvette Concept](#) appears to have survived, though any heat or smoke damage remains unclear. This radical, all-electric C10-inspired prototype with striking two-tone paint and futuristic aerodynamics was never meant for production, but its survival is a rare bright spot from the blaze."
